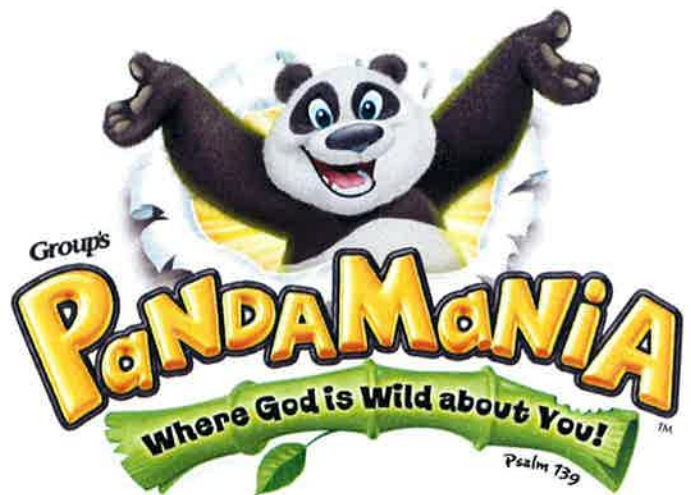

*A Healthy Picture Financially*

We've been hearing in the Business Office that many of you are concerned about our financial health particularly in response to the reporting you see in the bulletins on Sundays. Now that we've gotten through 2010 and can look at our progress, I want to share it with you.

In regards to the reports in the bulletins, the amounts reported on the back only reflect our offerings for either our general fund or the mortgage fund. In 2010, the gap was closed by \$133,034 in other

income. \$75,000 of this was our insurance settlements and the balance came from donations and building usage fees. The other side of that is also the fact that we did not spend as much as we budgeted.

Last March, our general operating budget was so strapped that, had it not been for the insurance checks, our staff would not have been paid. This March is drastically different. By reducing our spending and your generous hearts, we began 2011 with a reserve of just over \$90,000. This amount helped sustain us during

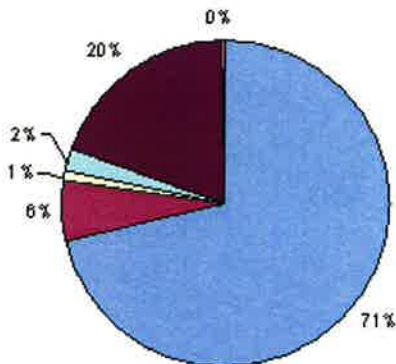
the typical slow months of January and February and then some. Just like you would do at home, we now have money set aside in our "savings" to carry us through the rainy days.

Some of you may be asking if we will return to some of our practices we had prior to 2010. In reality, if we would return to a budget structure heavy on staffing, we will again become unhealthy financially. Please see the graphs below which illustrate this point.

\$951,784

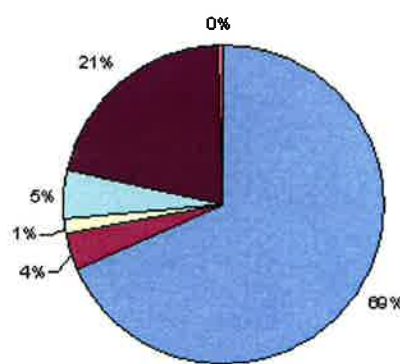
\$38,000 apportionments paid

\$783,097

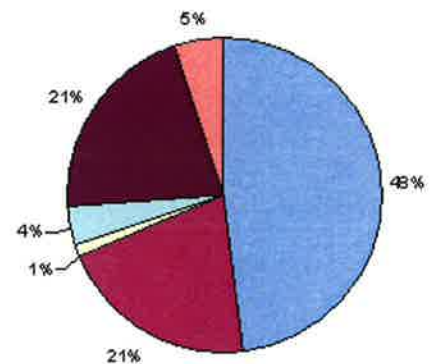
\$10,000 apportionments paid

**KEY:** starting with the largest section and moving clockwise as a percentage of total expenses, the sections are: Staff Salaries & Benefits; Missional Giving (including what was or will be paid to apportionments); Worship; Caring Ministries/Education/Youth; Facilities; and Administration

A healthy church spends between 35-50 % of their budgets on staff and 15-25% on missional giving. As you can see as we move into our projections for 2011, we will be a more healthy church in using our resources.

Our mortgage fund is also healthy. Those that have pledged to the Living Vine campaign have faithfully given. Coupled with part of the insurance money and a significant gift last spring, the mortgage fund has the ability to make our mortgage payments until

mid-summer. By that time, our Faith Forward to the Finish Line drive will be in full swing moving us to the elimination of the mortgages.

The Endowment fund is also doing well considering the volatile market place. The Finance Committee requested no transfers last year allowing the portfolio to grow from \$1.7 million in May 2010 to \$2.3 million in February 2011. The Permanent Endowment Committee has been meeting regularly and will be sharing its progress/plans with the congregation later this year.

While this is a quick snapshot of First Church's finances, I hope you feel encouraged and reassured that we are again on track financially to "making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of our community and world". Please always feel free to come ask how we are doing or let me know what kind of information you would like to see regarding our finances.
